SAL Community Services strengthens children, families, and individuals to build and enhance thriving communities.

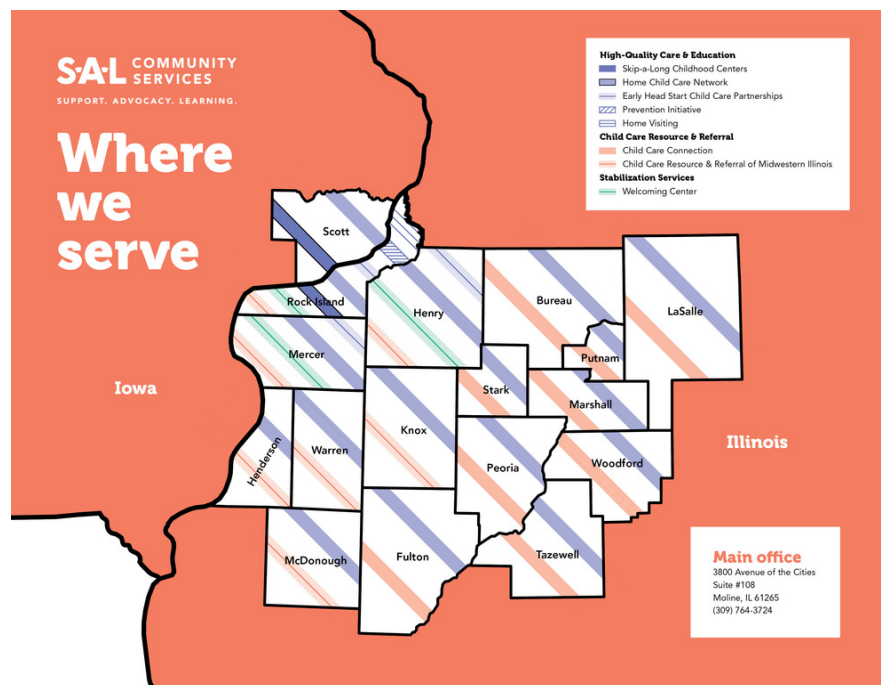
Who We Are

Community & Partnerships

At SAL Community Services, we know that community work takes more than just one organization. That's why we continually seek to work alongside organizations, partners, and officials to share services and resources, expand opportunities, and advocate for our communities.

SAL continued a partnership with the **Illinois Latino Policy Forum** to facilitate a research project at Skip-a-Long Childhood Center Rock Island.

SAL hosted a Annan Liu, an early childhood development professional from China, for a three-week fellowship to explore our programs through the **NCUSCR Professional Fellows Program**.

SAL hosted our first intern, Alexis, studying Occupational Therapy from **St. Ambrose University**. She worked on providing mental health and self-care projects for families and staff.

SAL partnered with **East Moline Public Library** to offer weekly drop-in hours at the library. Parents and guardians could seek assistance with a variety of child care and enrollment needs, free of charge.

SAL's Home Child Care Network partnered with **Birth to Five Illinois** and **YMCA Canton** to present Together We Grow: Families First Festival.

SAL continued our partnership with **Goodwill of the Heartland** to support our families through vouchers and expand access to Goodwill's employment support pathways.

SAL partners with **Family Resources** to provide referrals for children or families needing services for abuse, crime, foster care, adoption, mental health & counseling, and more.

SAL Community Services partnered with **United Way Quad Cities** to host a United Way Week that raised money for both United Way and SAL.

Partnered with **Quad City Symphony Orchestra** as a CAP Partner. This allowed SAL to provide free symphony tickets to staff members and anyone utilizing our services throughout the season.

Early Care & Education Programs

Skip-a-Long Childhood Center Davenport

Skip-a-Long Davenport is our only Skip-a-Long center located in Iowa. Situated on Crow Creek Road on the border between Bettendorf and Davenport, this center primarily serves residents of Scott County with a handful of children from Clinton County and Rock Island County. Skip-a-Long Davenport serves children 6 weeks through 6 years old through full-time care for Infants, Toddlers, and Two-Year-Olds, Preschool, and the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program.

Program Updates

- Attended preschool fairs throughout the year hosted by Bettendorf Library and Davenport Library to support family enrollment
- Partnered with Estes Construction to sponsor families over the holidays. This year, Estes graciously provided food baskets to numerous SAL sites in addition to Davenport.
- Offered classroom field trips throughout the year, including a field trip to Estes Construction in December to share songs with their team.

Program Success

A nearby child care center announced plans to close their site. Families reached out to our Skip-a-Long Davenport center with worries about losing their access to child care. We were able to enroll four families immediately, ensuring there was no gap in their children's high-quality early care and education journeys.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

- Two staff members achieved their CDA (Child Development Associate) credentials through our registered apprenticeship program, with seven more in process.
- Family Service Provider (FSP) attended annual Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) conference to share valuable resources with our program.
- Two preschool teachers participated in Child-Teacher Relationship Training (CTRT), a three-phase process over several weeks to support the classroom environment. This series is offered from a partnership with a Mental Health Consultant from EveryChild.

- Received a Tyson Foods grant for materials and equipment to open a new preschool classroom.

NEW CENTER UPDATES

SAL Community Services hosted an official groundbreaking ceremony for the new Skip-a-Long Rock Island center on October 3, 2025. Estes Construction began work in August 2025 and we expect to open in the Fall of 2026.

The new center is located on 11th Street and 21st Ave in Rock Island adjacent to Friendship Manor. Every inch is designed for exploration and growth, from naturally lit classrooms and fully equipped learning spaces to seamless outdoor play areas and an indoor gym that keeps kids moving year-round. Added classrooms will bring the capacity to 192 children and create 12 additional jobs.

It's more than a building, it's a community hub. Our partnership with Friendship Manor will create a powerful intergenerational learning experience bringing together seniors and children daily. It's the first of its kind in the Quad Cities and only the third in Illinois. Intergenerational programming is a rare and proven model that improves mental, physical, and emotional health for seniors while helping children develop communication skills, empathy & patience, and a deeper connection to the community.

Early Care & Education Programs

Home Child Care Network

The Home Child Care Network (HCCN) serves 17 counties from the Quad Cities to Peoria. It works to support families needing non-traditional care and providers with a home-based child care business. For families, HCCN offers non-traditional hours of care (1st, 2nd, 3rd shifts, weekends, holidays, and overnights) as well as rural locations so that children in licensed home child care settings receive the same high-quality care as children in center-based settings. HCCN also offers free support, supplies, training resources, and more to licensed home child care providers and supports potential providers through the licensing process. We have offices in Moline, Galesburg, and Peoria.

Served 416 children and 89 child care providers

30 YEARS OF THE HOME CHILD CARE NETWORK

The Home Child Care Network started in 1996 with just a handful of providers and children in the Quad Cities. From expanding to Peoria in 2009, opening our Galesburg office in 2025, and launching a non-traditional pilot program last year, the network continues to grow alongside the families and communities we serve. HCCN staff and providers celebrated at the annual contract compliance meetings held in June in each city.

Early Care & Education Programs

Prevention Initiative

Prevention Initiative (PI) works with parents and families with children aged birth to three to provide comprehensive and evidence-based child development and family support services to help build strong educational foundations that will prepare children for later school success.

Served 106 children across child care centers and family settings

Program Updates & Successes

For Families and Children

- Hosted monthly parent education opportunities and partnered with EHS quarterly on topics such as potty training, dental health, screen time, arts and mental health, healthy meals and snacks, and more.
- Family Advocates supported families with learning to set and accomplish goals to improve family's quality of life
- Family Advocates found resources such as clothing, furniture, and household items for families in need.
- Continued well-rounded home visit plan to offer 2 home visits per year to each family.
- Continued offering online ASQ-3 and ASQ-SE to families

For Providers

- Offered training to teachers and family child care providers (on topics such as Conscious Discipline, Culturally Responsive Teaching, Active Supervision, and Illinois Early Learning Guidelines in their lesson plans)

Early Head Start Child Care Partnership

Early Head Start Child Care Partnership (EHS) provides individualized services to low-income infants and toddlers up to age 4, as well as pregnant parents and their families, living in Henry, Mercer, and Rock Island counties. It's a comprehensive program that empowers families to meet the emotional, cognitive, and social needs of children so they can grow into self-sufficient and thriving adults.

Early Care & Education Programs

Home Visiting

Home Visiting launched in FY25 as an expansion of the existing EHS home-based services through IDEC. Home Visiting supports pregnant people and parents with young children aged birth to 5 who live in Rock Island County. This program is free to families who qualify and provides free, individualized visits for families from pregnancy until children enter kindergarten, reflecting each family's needs, goals, and schedule.

Program Successes:

- A child with development delays became potty trained.
- A family that had paused services re-engaged and is ready to resume visits.
- One family began using community resources shared by their Family Educator.
- One family scheduled children's eye appointments after previously delaying care.
- One family re-enrolled their children in school.
- A family began family counseling and play therapy and has shown positive growth.
- One parent preparing to transition from the program independently found a welcoming food pantry.
- One family explored housing options while staying in Rock Island County to continue services.
- A parent improved communication with daycare teachers to support her child's development.
- One parent practiced active listening to improve communication with her spouse.
- The program welcomed three healthy newborns to the caseload.

These successes reflect family progress in health care access, child development, education, mental health, relationships, self-sufficiency, and community engagement.

Home Visiting is fully staffed with four Family Educators and one Home Visiting Manager. Staff credentials include two Master's degrees, one Bachelor's degree, and two Associate degrees. Two staff members are working towards bachelor's degrees.

Child Care Resource & Referral

Child Care Connection of Central Illinois

Child Care Connection of Central Illinois (CCCCI) is one of two Child Care Resource & Referral programs under SAL Community Services. These programs are part of a statewide network of agencies funded by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS). CCCCCI serves the counties of Bureau, Fulton, LaSalle, Marshall, Peoria, Putnam, Stark, Tazewell, and Woodford.

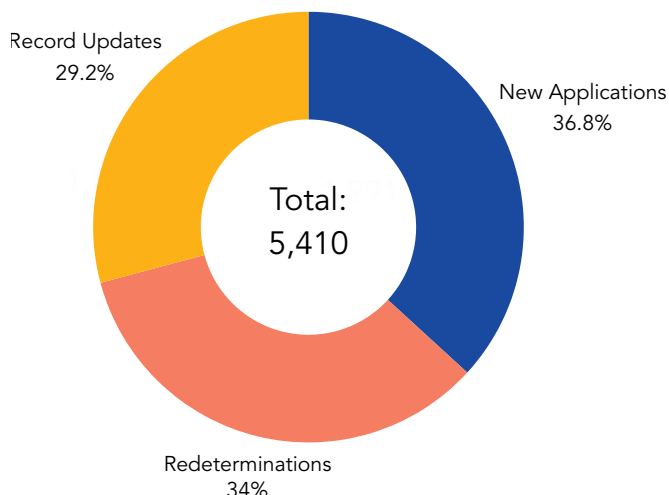

Welcoming Center

The Welcoming Center is a one-stop human service center designed to provide accessible services to local immigrants, refugees, and those whose first language is not English. Services are offered in 8 languages including English, French, Spanish, Swahili, Burmese, Haka Chin, Kimbembe, and Lingala.

Through our services, the Welcoming Center continues our commitment to empowering immigrants, refugees, and LEP members by providing compassionate, culturally responsive support that promotes self-sufficiency, stability, and long-term success. We find that our top-five case management needs were translation, employment, housing, food, and advocacy.

Program Updates & Successes

- Welcoming Center staff distributed essential items, including clothing, food, diapers, and hygiene products, to meet clients' basic needs across the year.
- **Immigration:** A visually impaired, disabled, and widowed client faced significant language and health barriers while pursuing US citizenship. With support from our staff and a trusted community partner, the client successfully completed their naturalization process and became a US Citizen at an Oath of Allegiance Ceremony at Augustana College in November.
- **Employment:** A recent immigrant sought employment assistance after facing language barriers and limited work experience. Through our employment workshops, ongoing case management, and a referral to a local employer willing to provide training, the client successfully interviewed and was offered a job.
- **Housing:** A customer facing a large, unexpected housing balance after losing her job turned to our program for support and advocacy. Crisis intervention funds and a negotiated payment agreement with her housing complex helped her avoid displacement and remain safely housed while navigating her employment loss.
